Lendrum Community League Social Events Report

January 2015 – February 2016

January 3: New Year Celebration (2-5pm)

- 30 people came to the hall for shinny, sledding, kick-sled racing and fireworks, as well as board games & colouring in the hall with hot chocolate to warm up
- Fireworks requires permit from city and permission from fire department (all free)
- Each family was asked to bring holiday treats for snacks, Lendrum provided hot chocolate, coffee & popcorn
- No fee to attend
- Volunteers for set up (2), fireworks (2) and clean up (2). Next year: 3-5:30pm.

February 22: Winter Fair (12-4)

- ~85 people came for horse & sleigh ride and outside fun. +2°C so perfect day for it.
- Dick Laurin Hay Rides (750\$), City of Edmonton provided Kick sleds, snowshoes, outdoor fun kit and inside fun kits (free), rental of sound system (Long & McQuade 37\$)
- Volunteers for set-up (2), supervising sleigh, stoking fire pit & kitchen supervision(8x30 min slots), clean up (2). Next year will change to 3 x set up & clean up, and 1/hr for circulating volunteer
- No fee to attend, permit from City for fire pit
- A-K sweet snack, L-Z savoury. Lendrum provided hot chocolate, coffee, juice, popcorn

April 13: AGM

- Approx 35 people attended (including board)
- Costs 45\$ (bottle white, bottle red, bottle coke, triscuits, veggie tray & dip, cheese & pepperoni platter from Superstore)
- Four tables in a square for attendees, chairs around perimeter if needed.

June 20: BBQ and Soccer Party (12-4)

- Bouncy castle x2, Burger & Hot dog BBQ, photo booth, music & speakers, parachute & games from City, Soccer demos from teams, medal ceremony
- 2 soccer teams (U8 and U10) had tournaments that weekend, so missed the event, otherwise well-attended
- No fee to attend
- Sunny day so good attendance by community. Lots of volunteers from soccer families for variety of jobs (see Volunteer Duty List)

June 27: Outdoor Movie Night

- Organized by Pleasantview CL. All costs to Pleasantview, Lendrum donated the space/venue
- Classic cars, food trucks, dance troupes, arts and crafts, face painters, then Grease when the sun went down. Pleasantview CL had their soccer medal ceremony.
- 50 people to watch the movie, up to 80ish for total event.

- Permits required from City for movie rights, outdoor screen use.
- Biggest problem was late sunset for movie start time. Good time had by all!

August 14: Campout Under the Stars

- Friday evening ~1700h – Saturday morning ~1100h
- Conflict with ESSC tourney, so tents in the field. Make sure to check with Harvey re: field use.
- 8 families or so tented, more for campfire and smores
- Very relaxed event

October 3: Turkey Trot 10:30

- Weather dependent and the weather was horrible (3 deg and raining!) so only about 10 walkers/runners attended
- Don't use tape on the black lampposts because it leaves residue
- This year's event was combined with the Playground Grand Opening (organized by the Playground Committee).
- Turkeys donated by Safeway and Sanderman family

November 21: Chili Cook Off 5-8

- About 65 people came to try 8 chilies provided by the community.
- Great event! Held from 5-8, votes counted at 7:30
- No profit this year as liquor had to be purchased
- 5\$ fee for bowl + spoon + 3 votes. LCL provided chips and buns for tables, as well as liquor license and insurance
- Volunteers for set up (2), tending bar (1 for 1st hour, 2 for 2nd and 1 for 3rd), and clean up (2)
- Next year need at least 10 chilies because we ran out at about 7:15

January 1, 2016: New Year's Day Event 3-5:30

- Fantastic weather so lots of people came out – over 100! Fireworks at about 5:15.
- LCL borrowed kick sleds and indoor games set from City of Edmonton. Lots of hockey & skating, sledding, playing in the new playground.
- LCL provided popcorn and hot chocolate, and fireworks (125\$). Community members brought holiday treats.
- No fee to attend
- Volunteers: set up (2), clean up (2) and fireworks (2)

February 21, 2016: Winter Fair (12-4)

- Fabulous weather, so huge turnout! Over 125 people over afternoon
- Dick Laurin Hay Rides (800\$), speakers from Long & McQuade (40\$). LCL provided coffee & hot chocolate, community members brought snacks to share
- Rented City of Edmonton equipment (kick sleds, giant soccer ball and giant connect four (big hits), inside games set, snow shoes, snow fort making kit). LCL provided paint & paper roll, snow graffiti bottles (both big hits). Planned for a fire pit (wood from John Porter) but it was too nice outside! Permit obtained from CRC for fire pit and use of parkland for sleigh ride.
- Volunteers: set up (2), circulating (1/hour), and clean up (3). Picking up and returning equipment takes most time and needs large vehicle.

Park Redevelopment 2015

Our neighbourhood’s vision is of an active, family-oriented, and vibrant community where neighbours share and connect. Lendrum’s goals include that residents interact, value the natural and athletic spaces, are engaged, and actively enjoy the park.

To the end, and in response to a needs assessment process in Lendrum in 2010, our community continues to work on projects to redevelop the recreational facilities in Lendrum Park requiring rehabilitation.

- Phase I of park redevelopment resulted in the construction of a new nature-themed playground in September 2015.
- 2015 also saw a new Park Redevelopment Committee form and restart the project to redevelop the existing aging spray deck into a dynamic and interactive spray park.

Newsletter Annual Report – 2015

We had four 16-page editions and one 20-page edition this year. Advertising revenues came in around \$1400, which helped to offset the cost of printing. Towards the end of 2015 I received more story ideas, ads and little notes from residents. Hopefully that will continue in 2016 and I can find room to incorporate them. As ever I welcome feedback on content and design.

Budget:

Printing Costs = \$2600

(For four 16-page newsletters and one 20 page newsletter per year plus a slight allowance for printing cost increases due to paper costs/falling dollar)

Delivery Costs ~ \$110-140 *5 = \$550 - \$700

Advertising Revenues (based on 2015's ads) ~ \$1000

(We actually made \$1400 in 2015 but I'm not sure if this will be typical given it was my first year of tracking revenue from ads)

Total Costs – Total Revenues = \$3300-1000 = \$2300

Ice rink 2015-16 season

Considering substantial weather challenges, the Lendrum ice rink had a successful year. The rink was open from December 20th 2015 through March 3rd 2016.

The bulk of the effort was done by Bryn Jones, Gary Goulden and Ben Willing. There were 6 other volunteers over the year including: John Porter, Matthew Hawkeye, Adam Gaumont, Rick Young, Ira Moehler and Roger Goulden.

Total recorded hours were 178 over the course of the winter. (Many more unrecorded hours for opening and closing the rink each day)

Total honorarium amounts were: \$1912.50

Total costs for fuel and equipment: \$121.12 (Note some repairs are to be completed)

Rink rentals:

The rink was rented on 3 separate occasions for private functions. (\$25/time=\$75)

Community use:

- Three kindergarten classes from Lendrum Elementary used the rink on a weekly basis in January and February.
- The Avalon physical education class used the rink for a skating section and a broomball section, which had the rink being used 3 full weeks from 8:30am to 3:00pm.
- Skating night by Sparks group.
- The rink saw fairly frequent use through the winter, particularly by families with kids on the weekends.
- The rink saw heavy during community events

Equipment:

There were very few equipment issues this year. The small sweeper is in need of repair and will be addressed in the coming months.

2016 AGM – Parks Report

2015 Review

Over the many years since the dry pond was built we continue to make strides towards maintaining and improving the park, our goal has always been **to create an area that residents could be proud of while showcasing the heart of our community**. The park contains 3 distinct areas with different needs, Sport Fields, Naturalized Area / Gardens, & Surrounding Green Spaces. The past year went very well with regards to the general upkeep and condition of the area. We have and will continue to work hard to make sure it is as good as it can be while balancing our efforts with the resources we have. Unfortunately we were hit hard by some long over due maintenance items on our major pieces of equipment. These one time costs will have an impact on the available resources for the next 3 years as we offset the impact over the next several budgets. Our other large budget item is water, due to the dry year water use was dramatically higher than previous years. (Thus the focus on our sustainability trial is so critical) Our goal is to reduce water usage by 35% this coming year, 50% in 2017, and 65-75% by 2018.

Some of the most visible and impactful aspects were;

- Rebuilt sprinkler system, as well as cutting decks and radiator on mower.
- Agreement in principle with City Parks & Rec towards the establishment of a shared use and maintenance plan for the area (Plan has been pending for 30 months...)
- Sustainable Soil Management – Enviro-Perfections – 3 year Trial Project (Mini Fields)
- Cooperation with City Forestry, plan is to nurse elms back to health over the next 3 years
- Installation of two new benches through the City bench program
- Overseeding & fertilization & composting of all field areas.
- Irrigation of playing surfaces, south facing hills, & naturalized areas during dry periods.
- Cutting grass areas between City cutting cycles, including weed eater (additional cuts when required).
- Hills are being cut weekly as the City cannot cut them safely, without rutting or scalping.
- Top dressing goal areas and damaged turf areas as required.
- Spring Aeration of 3 primary field areas
- Volunteer work bees (community members, teams, special interest groups).
- Clean up & weed control of parking lot area & paved areas.

- Planting of additional and replacement shrubs where required.
- Beautification of Hall with flowerpots and shrubs (Two plantings – summer & fall).
- Mulching & general maintenance of shrub beds.
- Pruning, weed control and general maintenance towards providing a healthy lush naturalized area.
- Manual Weed control on turf playing surfaces, volleyball courts and around rink boards.
- Use of the portable nets towards increasing use while spreading out wear patterns.
- Use of portable nets and training grids to assist coaches in providing better training situations while improving the enjoyment of users.
- Replacement of two soccer nets on mid size portable goals.
- Canvassed sports and user groups to donate time, funds, or materials.

Keys for 2016

- Adjust strategy towards reducing the financial burden on the community while maintaining the space to the best possible condition with in our limited resources.
- Work with City to maximize maintenance efforts (formalized plan that delivers benefits to our members).
- Work with the schools closely (drainage, wear issues, general clean up, student volunteers)
- Work with user groups towards donation of time and funds (net replacement, fertilizer, irrigation).
- Continue to upgrade irrigation system (repair and replace as needed, improve efficiency).
- Enhanced Maintenance cycles for mini fields (including fertilization, irrigation, and cutting)
- Promote bench program with plans for another 2-3 benches and possible picnic tables
- Recruit a team of volunteers to assist in the maintenance & supervision of the park.
- Identify areas where we would like to see additional trees & shrubs while removing dead growth (City and/or Community provided)
- Maintain all areas at similar levels to last year with the exception of the Baseball Diamond and and hill areas, cost over runs from 2015 need to be offset. This will be done with out effecting the main fields or mini's.
- We will also look at ways to reduce maintenance costs of equipment while also looking for ways to reduce water usage.

Projects

- Sustainable Soil Management – Enviro-Perfections – Trial Project (Year 2 of 3)
- Art in the park – Mural and other pieces with in the park
- Mini Fields & Track Area (enhanced maintenance & attracting special events)
By giving this area special attention this year our goal will be to attract the thousands of visitors that use this space (Especially young families with an interest in Soccer or Athletics) i.e. Youth soccer, Youth track events, possible FC Edmonton events.
- Lastly....Your Ideas !!! (how can we make it even better?)

The most important measure of our success comes down to something very simple, **how often is the space used? & Who is using it?** When we look at the answers it becomes obvious that we are on the right track, not only is the park usually busy, it attracts people of all ages, within our community and outside...

Lendrum Naturalized Area

2015

The naturalized area is well established at this point. Most of the new plantings are healthy and reproducing. There is a wonderful variety of grasses, native wildflowers, shrubs and trees. Our saskatoons continue to be magnificent producers of big delicious berries, as many Lendrum residents can attest. The wild strawberries and raspberries are present but a little more difficult to find. Perhaps the birds get to them first. Thanks to the efforts of some wonderful volunteers we tackled the thistle, cut back the clovers, pulled the foxtail barley and dug out dandelions. Once again the UofA Boot Camp students provided an afternoon of much appreciated help; weeding, pruning, mulching

and general cleanup. Dead trees were removed and some new plantings have gone in. The nest boxes were occupied and we were pleased to see swallows and clay-coloured sparrows swooping through the meadow. It also appears that solitary bees have used some of the chambers in the bee hotels. Since this is a “naturalized” area we are choosing not to irrigate, as native plants have evolved to deal with unpredictable precipitation. The thorny buffalo-berry has looked fabulous all winter with those bright orange berries still clinging to the branches.

Report On Hall Rentals

July 1- December 31, 2015

Thanks to Neil Moir who held responsibility for hall rentals for four years prior to July, 2015. This board position is largely invisible, but requires hospitality to renters, attention to details, availability to renters 24/7, monitoring and maintenance of the hall, and communication with renters and the board. Thanks, Neil, for your years of service!

From July to the end of 2015, the hall was booked for weekly, monthly or occasional use by Lendrum community programs (Sparks, Brownies & Guides, Line Dancing, Pottery, Tai Chi, Crafters, Men's Night, Mom's group yoga), service organizations (Mill Woods Family Resource Centre, Edmonton Sport and Social Club, Young Life), groups and individuals. The cost of renting the hall remains reasonable: \$50 for a half-day and \$100 for a full day for Lendrum residents.

In August Lendrum resident, Tim Lechelt, began serving as the handyman for Lendrum hall. What a difference his services have made! Tim replaced smoke alarms, fire extinguishers, fluorescent tubes, doorstops, kitchen faucet, and located replacement lenses for the 50-year-old fluorescent fixtures. Tim's initiatives coincided with UA Basecamp Day of Service on August 28, when two of the thirty UA students spent the afternoon assisting Tim to install dozens of light bulbs. Thank you, Tim, for sprucing up the hall and responding quickly to maintenance requests.

The board responded to concerns about hall rentals by passing two motions in November. The first concern was an increase in the number of rental requests from non-residents. The first step was to make it a requirement for Lendrum residents, who pay less for renting the hall, to have proof of current membership in the community league. The second step will be to require proof of current community league membership from non-residents. The second concern was that the large number of participants in beach volleyball tournaments generated traffic for folks who rented the hall for family celebrations. The board passed a motion that organizers of beach volleyball tournaments must rent the hall as well as the courts.

Actions Taken:

Recruiting for Lendrum Energy Committee, emailing with interested parties, newsletter advertisement

Studied EcoCity Edmonton community sustainability grant parameters, per email from Anna Vesala, became excited about possibility

Discussed idea with Allison Nitchke, received help, and feedback on tight timeline for grant application

Discussed possibility of getting quotes in time and drawing up a budget prior to March 7th, with industry leaders, told it is was a possibility, decided to attempt solar PV system budget, even if just for the learning experience

Attended Learning Session for grant application with EcoCity Edmonton and Alberta Ecotrust

Brainstormed ideas for application with particular focus on solar PV system, transportation xxx, and community impact,

Lined up 3 contractors for quotes

Did on-line research

Visited solar PV system installation at Evansdale Community League, spoke at length with ECL Sustainability Co-ordinator David Dodge, ECL President Jeff Muiselaar, Solar PV Systems P. Eng Gordon Howell, and toured site

Had 20 minute phone meeting with Robyn Webb from EcoCity Edmonton

Found out LCL does not have any power costs per Rick Young and Gary Goulden

PV project stalled for now, current grant application terminated. Gone skiing.

Recommendations:

Switch focus to community residents, businesses, schools: help them learn about sustainability and grant possibilities through outreach (newsletter, presentations at community events, youth involvement-?) and speaker series on sustainability.

Apply for grant (perhaps a different grant) for LEDs for rink lights, board lock rack (like a bike rack, but for skate boards, longboards, and scooters), solar powered air-conditioner, solar gazebo.

Revisit solar PV system for community league, eventually. Perhaps the city will be doubly interested to save money on power if they are currently paying.

Volleyball 2016 AGM Report

Use of the space:

We have one of the best facilities in Alberta. The sand is great, the number of courts, the visibility in the community, amount of activity people are doing.

Financial information:

The sand volleyball courts continue to bring in positive revenue to the community league budget. This past year we saw the third full season of the new courts in the rink. The full cost of the courts was just under \$51,000. We have a contact with the ESSC for the funding of the courts. We will begin to have revenue in 2016.

We have other renters of the courts including school groups, tournament organizers and one time users and community members.

Bookings:

We have league bookings every night of the week from 6 – 10 pm except Friday and Saturday. We have school groups in 4 – 6 Monday to Thursday. We have tournaments in about three times per month. We have at times challenges with hall bookings at the same time but we try to avoid big overlaps.

Concerns:

1. Parking – the use of the community parking is an issue but a positive issue when it controls the speed of the cars in the community.
2. Sand in the rink – We will continue to work with the ice makers to provide a flat surface in the fall. We will have to put more sand on the courts this year.

2016 Lendrum Civics Annual Report

Completed In 2015/2016

- Residential parking program for north-west Lendrum.
- Lendrum elected chair of the South Campus Neighbourhood Coalition (SCNC).
- Lendrum - as chair of SCNC - renewed the UofA-SCNC Memorandum of Understanding for another 4 years. The Memorandum says the UofA will work to get community input on new development.

For Next Year

- Develop an paper discussing options for an off leash area in or near Lendrum.
- Tell the new UofA Property Trust and the Minister of Advanced Education that Lendrum and other communities want meaningful input about new projects on the farm. The Trust's job is to develop lands on the University farm.
- If resident's have thoughts on the following projects, the civics representative can communicate those thoughts to the University or the City:
 - The new book storage facility (to be completed 2017).
 - The roof on Foote Field (to be completed in 2017).
 - The potential skating arena the University might build with the City's assistance (no date).
 - Changes to City bylaws facilitate infill (to be completed in 2016).
