

111 Street Intersection Periodic Closures

Intersection Closures at 49 Avenue, 51 Avenue, 54 Avenue, 57 Avenue, 60 Avenue

111 Street intersections at 49 Avenue, 51 Avenue, 54 Avenue, 57 Avenue and 60 Avenue will periodically close to eastbound/westbound vehicle traffic overnight on Friday November 6th, Saturday November 7th and Sunday November 8th from 7:00 p.m. until 5:00 a.m. the following day for signals testing of the South LRT extension.

- Signals testing is designed to simulate train movement without a train actually being on the tracks.
- Traffic gates will be lowered and signal lights/bells will be activated periodically, indicating temporary closure of the intersection for approximately 90 seconds, every five to ten minutes.
- As often as possible, the periodic closures will be timed to coincide with existing traffic signals by
 matching the closures with eastbound/westbound red lights, thereby minimizing traffic disruptions.
- No eastbound/westbound travel through the intersections during periodic closures.
- No left turns in all directions during periodic closures.
- Northbound/southbound travel along 111 Street will be permitted during periodic closures.
- No eastbound/westbound travel for pedestrians/cyclists during periodic closures.

The information in this bulletin is current to November 6, 2009. All dates are weather dependent. We thank you for your patience during our last year of construction on the South LRT Extension. What does hunger mean to you? It's a subjective word with many complex issues and meanings. Edmonton's Food Bank plans to explore this issue through a new interactive project.

Expressions of Hunger is an online photo, poetry and short prose contest, bringing awareness to five elements or categories of hunger: physical, emotional, spiritual, mental and environmental. The event was launched on Oct. 22 during Edmonton's Food Bank's annual Harvest Luncheon fundraiser.

"Edmonton's Food Bank is starting this new initiative because there are so many aspects of our community that are affected by different elements of hunger and we want to trigger discussions for change. We feel we have done a great job of serving hungry people since 1981. We want to raise awareness while continuing with our mandate," said Marjorie Bencz, CM, Executive Director of Edmonton's Food Bank.

"If you have an appetite for creative change, express yourself through Edmonton's Food Bank's *Expressions of Hunger*."

The idea for the contest was inspired by National Hunger Awareness Day (NHAD), which occurs the first Tuesday of June. The mission of NHAD is to tell the story of food banks and the people helped by them. The goal is to raise awareness about the solvable problem of hunger in Canada.

Expressions of Hunger is an eight-month awareness campaign, providing photographers and writers until March 31, 2010 to submit their work. During April 2010, the photos, poetry and short prose will be posted online for

the public to select the top three entries from each category. Winners will be notified on May 3, 2010 and an exhibition of their work will be launched at an Edmonton gallery on June 1, 2010. Edmonton's Food Bank is working with a few local galleries to rotate the exhibition at different locations throughout the month of June.

"The contest is open to the public and we hope people will be inspired by the categories. They can look beyond the literal definition of hunger. For example, how the environment is being challenged, what people yearn for spiritually, how is hunger shown emotionally?" said Bencz. She added people may be looking for a creative outlet to voice social change and reduce food insecurity.

"Having a different medium - visual and written - can produce various interpretations of hunger. Once those interpretations are seen online, we hope that it will motivate the public to become innovative, discuss solutions and act on them," said Bencz.

Meanwhile, Edmonton's Food Bank still sees the physical element of hunger every day of the year.

"Hunger in our community isn't going away. Our numbers have increased by 71.5 per cent in March 2009 from 2008. Forty per cent of our clients are children," she said.

A 'deep green' vision for U of A's south campus

Potential showcase for Expo 2017

A new urban village with electric vehicles, water recycling and energy made from biomass are elements of a

"deep green" vision for the University of Alberta's south campus that could be showcased in Expo 2017.

Those recommendations come from a panel of experts with the U.S.-based Urban Land Institute, a think-tank and research group, that visited the city in October at the invitation of the U of A and the province's energy and environment departments.

The institute's proposals, obtained by The Journal, say south campus provides a unique opportunity to build a "leapfrog" green project to establish a model for sustainable living for the province-- one that goes far beyond building energy-efficient buildings and recycling garbage.

By 2017, in time for the World's Fair, south campus could, for instance, convert from natural-gas heating to using biomass fuelstock to eliminate greenhouse-gas emissions. Expo 2017 could be run entirely on a district heating system that with a zero-carbon target, uses renewable energy and runs local vehicles on biogas made from garbage in bio-digesters on campus.

On request, the institute will assemble a panel of experts--architects, developers and planners-- to visit a city and offer "independent, candid advice" on large land-use projects, explained Alex Rose, president of ULI in Los Angeles and a senior vice-president of California-based Continental Development Corporation.

Rose, chair of the eight-member panel that came to Edmonton, said the university's idea was to look at south campus as a model of sustainability on all fronts: heat, transportation, buildings, etc. The job of the panel was to see how that vision could be accomplished "in a meaningful way," he said in a telephone interview from Los Angeles.

"It is left to the sponsor (the U of A) toaccept-- or not--our findings," he said.

"Our fondest hope is they use the panel as a jumping off point...that it does not sit on a shelf," Rose said. Alberta Energy is keen to move ahead on the sustainability agenda and south campus, "its own small community," offers a great opportunity, said Goldie Edworthy, who works in the department's small energy efficiency office.

"We were quite pleased and we want Alberta to do some leading-edge stuff," said Edworthy, who also attended the five-day event last month.

Officials from the University of Alberta were unavailable for comment.

Rose said the eight experts talked to about 50 people from business, government and the community, toured the city and south campus. He declined to discuss the specifics of the panel's recommendations made in a presentation at the end of the week. A final report is being written.

Be Idle Free

A Minute or Less is Best is the message encouraging Edmonton motorists to turn off their car's engine if they think they will be sitting idle for more than one minute, except in traffic.



The new campaign is starting small but it's hoped that through the City's partnerships with schools, and by providing information to local community leagues, the program will help motorists understand that idling for more than a minute is not only harmful to the environment, it also wastes gas and is damaging to car engines.

Information provided by the Alberta Motor Association (AMA) shows that not only does idling harm car engines through the build up of water condensation and fuel residue, but that idling a car to warm it in the winter is not even useful since parts like the transmission and wheel bearings only warm with driving.
