Alert (Safer Streets...You can help!!!

All residents please continue to be on the look-out for vehicles and motorcycles generating high levels of noise and speed; we need to have zero-tolerance for speeding within the neighbourhood. We are currently tracking license plate numbers of individuals that are breaking the law. If you notice any situation that we should be aware of, please call Neighbourhood Watch and/or the City Police to file a complaint. Motorists with a high number of complaints logged against them will see follow-up action by both our Neighbourhood Watch and the City Police....Your efforts are helping make Lendrum a safer place to live.

PUT YOUR CAR KEYS BESIDE YOUR BED AT NIGHT

If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

This tip came from a neighborhood watch coordinator. Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this: It's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key fob chain.

It works if you park in your driveway or garage If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break in your house, odds are the burglar or rapist won't stick around... after a few seconds all the neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there and sure enough the criminal won't want that.

And remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there.....This is something that should really be shared with everyone. Maybe it could save a life or a sexual abuse crime.

P.S. I am sending this to everyone I know because I think it is fantastic. It would also be useful for any emergency, such as a heart attack, where you can't reach a phone. A wife suggested to her husband to carry his car keys with him in case he falls outside and she doesn't hear him. He can activate the car alarm and then she'll know there's a problem.







Neighbourhood Safety

Light Up The Night

One of the best deterrents to crime is visibility, as it tends to increase the likelihood of a witness to any activity. The Light Up the Night Campaign was designed to improve residents' sense of security by increasing light on the streets. This campaign is traditionally launched Halloween Night. However, over the years we have expanded this to a year-round initiative.

We have all heard about turning lights on and off in our homes while we are away in order to give the appearance of someone being at home. This works on much the same principle. While it is true most home break-ins happen during the day, some do occur at night. Your risk of becoming a victim is reduced if your property is well lit.



Most streets in our city have street lamps and a number of the back lanes are lit as well. However you may have noticed that these lights are provided for vehicles, not people. Particularly in mature neighbourhoods, the boulevard trees tend to prevent this light from reaching the public sidewalks. By turning on your front and back lights, you not only provide pedestrian safety but you increase visibility in your yard as well.

We encourage you to either install a motion-activated or photosensitive spotlight to the exterior of your home. Motion activated lights are more common but some individuals have reported that the constant on and off lighting often created more anticipation of problems. Whichever you choose, the cost is only pennies a month. You acquire peace of mind while saving the financial and emotional costs of being a potential victim of crime.

The final benefit of this program is, that in the event a police or emergency response is required at your home, a neighbour's light will help them to identify the home address much more quickly.

Emergency Medical Services

Back to school safety



Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind parents and students of some basic road safety tips as streets become busier with the return of the school year. Pedestrians and motorists each have an important role to play- road safety is a shared responsibility.

Motorists

- Avoid talking on cell phones, texting, or any other behavior that diverts your attention away from driving.
- Give right of way to pedestrians who have activated overhead crossing lights or who are waiting to cross from a street corner.
- Remember it is illegal to pass vehicles, other than those that are parked, in school zones or playground zones during posted hours.

Around school buses

- Flashing amber lights mean a bus is slowing down to stop. Motorists should do likewise.
- No matter which direction you are coming from, STOP when approaching a school bus with activated flashing red lights - unless the bus is on the opposite side of a divided highway from you.
- Driver courtesy goes a long way. By simply being alert and cautious when approaching a school bus, you are contributing to school bus safety.

Pedestrians

- Cross only at marked crosswalks or street corners that have clear visibility from all directions.
- Make eye contact with all drivers before crossing the street.
- When activating overhead crossing lights, pause before stepping off the curb to ensure motorists in both directions have come to a complete stop.
- Stay within the crosswalk lines until fully clear of the road way.
- Obey pedestrian lights at intersections. Cross the street only when you see the 'walk' sign and only when all cars have come to a complete stop.
- If you are with young children or pets, hold your child's hand firmly and keep a solid grip on leashes when crossing.
- Remember: children learn by observing you. By teaching them safe crossing habits as early as possible you can reduce the chance your child may be involved in a preventable auto/pedestrian collision.

- To the parents who are planning playground redevelopments.
- To all the volunteers working to enhance our community.
- To those of you who have renewed their memberships.
- To Park Paving for maintaining access to our homes. Yes, sometimes getting in and out can be a problem, but this contractor has been very good about minimizing road closures and delays.

Good News

- A new house in Lendrum! Many of us enjoyed the spectacle of seeing an original Lendrum house lifted off its foundations and trucked away. A Lendrum family has started construction and hope to move in in the near future.
- The new sidewalks, lamp post and roads in the neighbourhood will be completed this fall, unless weather hampers the work.

Reasons to Get Involved

As a community, we have to deal with some issues that continue to affect the safety, liveability, and future of our neighbourhood.

- Traffic
 - Commuters shortcutting on 114 Street and 57 Avenue.
 - Traffic to and from the South Campus station and the Saville Centre (and soon the GO Centre) is speeding on 115^{th} Street even with the speed bumps!
 - Similarly, residents have noted increased traffic on 54^{th} , 53^{rd} , and 56^{th} Avenues as well as 113A and 114 A Streets.
- South LRT
 - The fence along 111th has a number of deficiencies.
 - Entrance signs before LRT construction, Lendrum and the all communities south us were promised signage that would identify the neighbourhoods. This has not been done.
- University Farm

- The U of A continues to replace farm land with buildings and supporting infrastructure (South Campus). We are the neighbourhood most affected by these changes and any future developments.

- Potential School Closures
 - Edmonton Public Schools is planning to close a number of schools in mature neighbourhoods throughout the city. Lendrum Elementary and Avalon Junior High are among the 70 schools being reviewed in the Southwest. A group of concerned parents have organized support for our two schools and they need your active involvement.
- Absentee Landlords
 - With the arrival of the LRT, and number of rental homes in Lendrum (and Malmo) has increased. Most of the landlords and tenants do a good job of maintaining their properties but others do not.

Reminders

Check your new sidewalk. It has only a two year warranty - and you are paying half the

cost. Some of the faults that must be reported before the two years are up:

- Cracks these might be either across the walk or along it
- Low spots water pools on the sidewalk
- Wrong slope water flows on to your property instead the road
- Spalling concrete is flaking off, usually at joints or the edge of curbs

If you notice any of these faults, send me an email with the location.

Renew your membership - or join the community league for the first time. The more members we have, the more influence we will have with our elected officials, especially since this is an election year.

DOGS ON-LEASH ONLY

Be a **responsible** pet owner and follow the rules of the Animal Licensing and Control, and Parkland Bylaws.

- ►License your dog
 - ▶Pick up after your dog
 - ► Leash your dog outside your property (unless in a signed off-leash area)
- Dogs are not allowed in parks, green spaces, sportsfields, picnic areas or on school grounds (even on leash).
- You can walk your dog on leash on permanent trails that cross through park spaces but, dogs must be kept
 10 metres from all playgrounds, sportsfields and picnic sites.
- When walking your dog, use a leash no longer than two metres (six feet) in length.

Fire Pits...what you need to know


Backyard fire pits and fire places are a great way to enjoy the outdoors, but they can be dangerous and the smoke and noise can disturb your neighbours. Fire pits are regulated under the <u>Community Standards Bylaw</u>. Here are a few things you need to do to make sure your fire is safe and legal.

Building a Proper Fire Pit

Within Edmonton city limits, fire pits must:

Be at least 3 meters (10 feet) from buildings, property lines and anything else that could catch fire

- Be less than 0.6 meters (2 feet) high
- Be less than 1 meter (3 feet) wide
- Have enclosed sides made from bricks, concrete or heavy-gauge metal
- Have a mesh screen on top to stop sparks (spark-arrestor) with openings smaller than 1.25 cm (1/2 inch) If your fire pit does not meet these specifications, you will need to have <u>Fire Rescue Services</u> inspect it and issue you a permit. To book an inspection call 780-496-3628.
