



- We used to run skating lessons every year. If you are interested in having lessons again, call Gary, our programs coordinator.


From the October community league meeting:

People Helping People to Prevent Crime Working With You in the Community

Neighbourhood Watch is a program aimed at reducing crime in the community. It involves getting to know one's neighbours and introducing them to the concept of Neighbourhood Watch – that is, good neighbours working together, alert to the potential of crime and willing to look out for one another's interests.

Neighbours working together through Neighbourhood Watch can combat crime in their area the most effective way – before it starts. Through the active participation of citizens in crime prevention, Neighbourhood Watch provides a means of reducing the opportunity for crime to occur. Citizens are taught how to make their homes less inviting as a target for thieves; how to participate in Operation Identification, making their personal property less desirable to burglars; and, how to be alert to suspicious activity in their neighbourhoods.

Very few people are in a position to protect their homes and property all of the time. Vacation, business and shopping trips, or even an evening out will eave home unattended and vulnerable to theft. The Neighbourhood Watch program will provide a sense of security for individuals or families who leave their homes for any length of time. The program will also help to co-ordinate the efforts of the police and the community in tracking down criminals. Strong community involvement is encouraged because neighbour unity can deterrime. Neighbours joined together do help correct situations that threaten their peace and safety.

Some simple tips to prevent theft of your vehicle and theft from your vehicle. Working together, we can reduce vehicle crime in your community. Here are some tips on how to protect your vehicle and valuables:

- Lock your car doors and close all windows.
- Never leave your car running unattended.
- Don't hide keys in your vehicle.
- Park in a sensible place, avoiding unlit areas at night...
- Consider installing a car alarm or an anti-theft device such as a steering wheel bar lock, an engine disabler switch, etc.
- Don't leave valuables in your car. Even small items such as CD's, iPods, laptops or change can be tempting to a thief.
- If you must leave valuables in your vehicle, lock them in the trunk before reaching your destination.
- Use portable mounts for add-on stereo equipment.
- When you leave the car, you can take add-ons with you.

Planning Matters

No limit set for projects near LRT stations and major Transit Routes: High Density Development on the Way

The City is working on Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) Guidelines and Standards which would allow more intense developments around stations, while improving pedestrian and cycling access to the LRT stations. Maximum densities are not specified in the TOD guidelines because higher density around LRT stations is being encouraged in order to maximize ridership. New construction of single-family homes would not be permitted, with the exception of home replacements. Row housing and low rise apartments would be the smallest buildings developed in the 400 m radius of an LRT station and in the 200 m radius of a major transit route.

The EFCL has been asked to provide feedback on the draft TOD Guidelines which will be revised in the next few weeks. Your Community League District representatives on the EFCL Planning Committee have already provided some preliminary feedback to the City on the proposed Transit-Oriented Development policies.In general they have expressed support for moderately increasing density around transit stations and improving pedestrian and cycling accessibility. They have said that higher density housing around LRT stations should be family friendly, especially when there is a school within 800 m of the station. Infill housing should meet the family friendly housing guidelines being developed by EFCL.

In addition, they believe there should be limits on density in order to address quality of life issues and predictability. They support the mandatory 30 m separation of houses from larger scale housing; however, the 30 m separation is greatly opposed by the development industry, thus this requirement may be removed from the TOD standards, unless there is significant public demand.

Furthermore, EFCL Planning Committee members have expressed support for the mandatory pedestrian and cycling enhancements around stations, including shorter blocks, wider sidewalks and dedicated bike lanes.

Finally, they have asked that historic buildings on the LRT route be identified and protected, believing that the historical character of each neighbourhood should be honored. Before finalizing its response to the city the EFCL would like to hear from community leagues.

Creating a New Style of Low-Rise Apartments

Low rise apartments being built in mature neighbourhoods could take on a different look if a new set of regulations in a Medium Scale Residential Overlay is adopted.

Based on interpretations of the Residential Infill Guidelines, city planners are proposing a number of new regulations for infill apartments. For instance each apartment unit is to have a private outdoor amenity space – a yard or balcony. Presently this is not required.

Ground level units are to have a minimum 15m² of private amenity space, as well as private entrances. Common/shared outdoor amenity space would be required if the building had 20 or more units.

The Overlay also calls for additional setbacks and architectural treatments.

The EFCL Planning Committee is currently analyzing the first draft of the regulations and we need your input. Please contact Bev Zubot if you want to review the draft Overlay draft or attend a presentation by the Planning Department.

The Overlay is scheduled to go before City Council in December.

Chef Henry Palmer's Hotel Selkirk Pumpkin Bread

- 1 (15 ounce) can of pumpkin puree or 1 whole pumpkin, baked and mashed
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2/3 cup water
- 3 cups white sugar

Cold weather safetv



Alberta Health Services EMS responds to many cold weather related emergencies every winter. Simple actions such as dressing appropriately and anticipating sudden weather changes can help keep you both warm and safe this season. And don't forget to wear a toque – a significant percentage of body heat lost escapes from the top of your head!

Frostnip

- Frostnip occurs when skin is extremely cold, but not frozen. It commonly affects the ears, nose, cheeks, fingers and toes.
- The skin appears red but also turns to white when pressed. It may feel numb to the touch.
- When treated promptly, frostnipped skin will heal without complication.
- Gently re-warming the affected area in a warm environment is advised.

Frostbite

- Frostbite is when skin becomes so cold, the skin and underlying tissue freeze completely.
- It may look white and waxy and will feel hard to the touch.
- Treatment begins with removal from the cold environment and placing the affected area in warm, not hot, water (about 41°C) until re-warmed.
- Seek further medical attention as required.

Hypothermia

- Hypothermia is abnormally low body temperature (less than 34°C as compared to normal body temperature of about 37°C).
- People suffering hypothermia may act inappropriately with uncharacteristic stumbling, mumbling, and fumbling, as their body temperature continues to lower.
- Early recognition and prompt medical attention is crucial. Left untreated, hypothermia may progress to coma and death.
- Call 9-1-1. Don't forget to protect yourself from the factors that originally lead to the patient's situation.
- Gentle re-warming should start as quickly as possible including: removal of wet or constrictive clothing, covering with blankets or sleeping bags, and protecting the patient from further heat loss (wind, moisture and contact with cold surfaces).

Neighbourhood Bissell Donation Centre The Old IGA on 122st !!!

I love being able to donate to a worthy cause and of all the charities I have worked with, Bissell is **one of very few** that I would highly recommend. I select my charities of choice by seeing **what they do in our community** and Bissell makes a difference.

The Bissell Centre runs an inner-city kitchen to feed the homeless, along with various other programs committed to fighting poverty. The Community Closet is a voucher-based system assisting low-income families and individuals by providing basic essentials of clothing and household goods at no charge. An Intake Resource Worker is available daily to meet with community members who have immediate needs such as obtaining medical care, clothing and house ware vouchers, social assistance, and advocacy. The Robert Tegler Friendship Room (Adult Drop-In) is a space for men and women to get their basic daily needs met. Toilet, shower and laundry facilities are available as well as telephones, a daily meal and coffee. Other services include free haircuts, adult literacy, care from Capital Health Community Health Nurses and sexually transmitted infections (STI) nurses. Mental Health Support works with individuals who have mental health concerns, and often-concurrent addictions issues, and who do not have appropriate supports to address their daily living needs. The program helps people to function successfully in the community by reducing the barriers involved in meeting their economic, social and personal needs.

They are working with whom we would like to help but often are limited in our time but **we can make a difference**. Working with charities needing donations, the biggest question is "What do I donate?" If you'd like to help, the Centre is always looking for

- basic toiletries, you know those hotel sample size bottles? These are IDEAL as each individual gets their own. Shampoo, soap, toothpaste, shavers...
- new and used clothing, Please remember these are to be worn and/or sold (if the homeless can't wear the high heels or Tommy bathing suit you donate) so please donate goods that are wearable or sellable. Note – your donation goes to the mission FIRST at Bissell.
- Shoes and boots
- Purses and bags
- Toys
- Household pots and pans, cutlery, glasses, nic naks,
- furniture
- craft supplies,




