

- When walking your dog, use a leash no longer than two metres (six feet) in length.





Theft from Auto...Lendrum's #1 Crime

Most vehicle crime is opportunistic and therefore preventable. By following some straightforward advice, and working together, we can ensure that this type of crime is reduced in your community. Some of the advice may sound obvious and rather simple but it could make all the difference if you follow it consistently. The cost and the time you must spend on repairs, replacement of stolen items can be easily prevented by following some simple tips.

Tips to prevent thefts from your vehicle.

Remove all Valuables - Never leave ANYTHING on display when you leave your vehicle. Even loose change, cigarettes, cigarette lighters, sunglasses, CD's, cell phones, stereos, cameras, and clothing, if they can see it they will steal it.

Park Safely - When parking at home, always use your garage if you have one, and lock both your vehicle and your garage. If you don't have a garage, try to park in a well-lit, open place. When parking at work or your local mall, park in a well-lit open place.

Remove Portable Accessories - Removing stereo face plates and locking them in the trunk or taking them with you, will deter thieves.

Get an Alarm Installed - Alarms can deter thieves not only from stealing items from your vehicle, but also from stealing your vehicle. Even if you have an alarm installed NEVER, NEVER, NEVER leave anything in your vehicle. Thieves can smash a window, reach in grab an item and be gone in seconds, before your alarm is even activated.

Use a Steering Locking Device (The Club) · Use a steering wheel lock every time you leave your vehicle. A vehicle that is well secured has a tendency to deter criminals. A steering wheel lock will also deter theft of your vehicle.

Lendrum Community League South Campus Update

Introduction

The nature of the development of South Campus/University Farm is of crucial importance to Lendrum.

In the past, considerable concern was expressed about the top-down nature of relations between the University and its neighbouring communities. However, the South Campus Neighbourhood Coalition has now dropped its lawsuit against the University, and a Memorandum of Understanding has been signed with the aim of ensuring a more genuine basis for future consultations. Lendrum is a member of the new South Campus Consultation Group (SCCG) that includes senior University representatives. The process followed by current development proposals will be the test of this Memorandum.

A different political climate also exists with new personnel in key positions: MLA (Steve Young), UofA Chair of Board of Governors (Doug Goss), and Minister of Enterprise and Advanced Education (Stephen Khan).

The Memorandum notes that items are to be brought to the table for consultation once "targeted planning dollars" are allocated to allow for early conceptual input. The following groups of projects were identified at SCCG meetings on June 14 and July 5:

Projects proposed within the next year

- 1. "63rd Avenue Access" to South Campus from 122nd Street.

 South Campus needs at least one additional access. Such development will provide very necessary relief of traffic pressure on Lendrum, but some Grandview residents have expressed concern about these plans as being based upon inadequate traffic reports.
- 2. The Vehicle Pool will move to a new Maintenance Facility to be located north of Agri-Food Discovery Place; the site of the existing Vehicle Pool will be used to build a division of Protective Services (campus security). Not a controversial development but I'd like to see a reasonable maximum placed on the number of vehicles that the facility could accommodate.
- 3. Site modifications. South of the Saville Centre: addition of lighting and stall lines in area that was formerly used by the Vehicle Pool. Go Centre: pathway to be built on north side and lighting improvements to meet pedestrian standards. Gate to control access to government lots for event (evening/weekend) parking. I'm happy to see the newly-opened link between the campus entrance from Lendrum and the multi-purpose trail that goes along the LRT line.

Projects proposed within the next one or two years

- 1. Twin or triple ice arenas. Supported in principle by the City with impending closure of Tipton and Scona arenas. It will be at least two years before construction begins. This will involve movement of Metabolic and Poultry buildings to "agricultural sector" south of 61st Avenue. Likely parkade to be located west of Saville Centre.
- 2. Michener Park: redevelop some existing buildings, and increase capacity for graduate student housing.

Projects proposed but without current funding

- 1. Alberta Athletics seek track upgrade for 2015 Pan Am Juniors. Possible legacy building: enclosed six-lane track within current track footprint.
- 2. Student housing with proximity to LRT station.
- 3. "Phase 1 Power Plant" to ensure capacity for South Campus. A potential public-private partnership. This was initially planned on the perimeter close to Lendrum but in response to expressed concerns has been moved towards the centre of 60th Avenue.

Personal Commentary

It is vital that Lendrum takes full advantage of the opportunity to provide input into these developments given their significant impact on our neighbourhood. This needs to be conceptual input and should go well beyond suggestions for (say) landscape design.

When assessing a proposal for a specific development, it is important to look beyond specific merits and include bigger picture implications such as the addition to traffic volume and parking requirements.

As plans evolve for this 21st century campus, care needs to be taken to ensure we are not hamstrung by traditional mindsets regarding education, car use, etc. Plans have to incorporate projections about how the shape of education may be impacted by distance learning; they should also learn from experiments in urban design from other cities.

A) **LRDP** The University's Long Range Development Plan seeks to develop a research-intense campus as well as contribute to the community. This contains Strategic Planning Principles that state that development should be environmentally, socially and economically sustainable. But how can such a balance be measured? These principles need to be more than simply "aspirational" like an abstract feel-good vision statement; rather they should provide a coherent workable framework. Are some principles likely to be sidelined in the plausible situation of limited implementation dollars? What should happen when Proposal X achieves some principles but fails to adhere to recognized environmental standards?

Local neighbourhoods strongly welcomed the goal of a pedestrian-centred campus. However, 2008 plans talk of "minimizing vehicular intrusion", while 2010 plans talk of "limiting vehicular access to the periphery of the site". Such change gives the sense that the University is backtracking.

There are plans for this campus to eventually have 15,000 students and nearly 5,000 faculty and staff. The "seed faculties" are Agriculture and Physical Education which both have competing visions of how future development should proceed. The land use category of "research facilities" seems to allow very broad interpretation.

Building the cyclotron facility on the Balmoral site to produce medical isotopes represents a rather rushed change in the land use designation. Questions remain whether the facility should have been sited closer to the airport.

Amendments to the LRDP need to follow an open consultative process to avoid misunderstanding and misrepresentation; there should not be surprises. Residents seek certain guarantees, while the university is reluctant to make long-term guarantees.

B) **Recreational facilities** The Go Centre provides a dubious example of neighbourhood consultation since many people were happy with initial exterior designs that were apparently abandoned due to cost overruns and/or a shortfall in expected funding. It meets international standards for basketball/volleyball but there are questions over energy-efficiency and economic viability.

University plans originally designated sections for "academic" development and now the designation is "academic and shared use". How should we respond to the proposal to construct ice arenas? Co-use certainly has major implications for traffic. Is this due



to revenue generation? While all the university's recreational facilities are open for some public access, the balance seems uneven. University representatives resist shared use guidelines; but broad parameters seem necessary. For example, if 80% is non-campus use, is this still within the university's mandate?

C) **Traffic/Parking** The current volume of traffic making its way through Lendrum to access South Campus is unacceptable. We need to consider the extent to which South Campus is being used/abused to make up for the oversight in City plans for LRT park-and-ride. As well as players and spectators of the Saville/Go Centre facilities, a lot of the current volume of traffic through our neighbourhood results from those wanting to park and ride the LRT, along with drop off/pick up of LRT passengers. It is hugely important to Lendrum that this volume is reduced when an additional campus access is opened.



Action will be taken to make cross-campus short-cutting difficult. I wonder if differential access fees could serve to discourage single-driver vehicles. Initial ideas for 3700 parking spots have been reduced to 3000 spread between three parkades. One of these parkades for between 600-800 spots is planned to be close to Lendrum's 60th Avenue entrance. Some planners talk about having "only" one parking space for every five students compared with the 1:4 ratio on North Campus. However, it needs to be asked if we can't do better than this.

D) **Sectors 13 and 14**It has been stated that land south of 60th Avenue will maintain its agricultural focus. The University is being less than open about the plans for this sector, perhaps due to divisions within the Agricultural Faculty. One representative has guaranteed that it will not be developed for at least the next thirty years; but Lendrum needs to pay particular attention to where the Metabolic and Poultry units will be relocated. Sector 14 is the "West 240" with future development plans that are becoming more specific with particular consultations with Landsdown and Grandview communities.

E) **Golflands** There was a meeting in early July between Malmo Community League and Westcorp concerning the development of the Golflands to the south of 51st Avenue. Apparently the idea of a seniors' complex has been dropped, but the development will involve lots more rental units (up to 500); a significant influx of new Malmo residents. Given the position, it seems odd that this development is not being incorporated within the University's plans for student housing.

In conclusion, some elements are in place for the development of a state of the art campus that is an asset to the university, local residents and taxpayers. There are also some worrying precedents, along with procedural vagueness that could be exploited to the detriment of local neighbourhoods.

What additional information would you like to have?

What do you think of the goals of the South Campus Neighbourhood Coalition, and does such a coalition allow us to pursue Lendrum's specific interests most effectively within its shared agenda?

In order to raise necessary dollars, the University is considering public-private partnerships that will involve fifty-year leases. Given financial problems with comparable P3 developments, are there alternatives that they should be exploring?

The produce market at the Green & Gold Community garden, on the University of Alberta South Campus, will be open through the fall. The garden will have root vegetables (potatoes, carrots, parsnips, beets, onions), as well as lettuce, spinach, chard, kale, and squash, many varieties of herbs and flowers (all weather permitting).

The garden is an initiative of the University's School of Public Health and Faculty of Agricultural, Life and Environmental Sciences. Volunteers operate the garden and all of their time, and most of the seeds, plants and equipment used are donated. The vegetables, herbs and flowers are "spray-free" (no pesticides or artificial fertilizers are used).

All money raised from the "sale" of garden produce goes to the **Tubahumurize Association**, a non-profit organization in Rwanda that provides socially and economically marginalized women with vocational training, counselling, life-skills coaching, health care education, and opportunities for sustainable income generating activities.


