





Ecole Avalon Lendrum School News



The end of the school year is fast approaching and with it comes many exciting events and extremely busy times.

As it usually happens the young of our community teach all of us lessons in life. Lendrum students are no exception; they set a great example this past month. In celebration of Earth Day (April 22) the students cleaned up the playground and dry pond area by picking up all the trash and sweeping the winter gravel off the sidewalks. They also engaged in a "No Power Hour" where technology was put to sleep and the lights were shut off. If everyone does their part we can all minimize our footprint on this planet.

Lendrum students held their annual Spring Tea and Gallery Walk. This was a time to showcase their artistic talents while showing appreciation to their family and friends. There was a large assortment of treats available along with beverages served by our grade 6 students, and door prizes awarded throughout the evening. Parents and guests were treated to musical entertainment performed by the students; as well the students' artistic endeavors were on display in the hallways.

Students at Lendrum are "SPELLING IT OUT" for computers. This year's annual spell-a-thon proceeds will be earmarked for the purchase of new computers for the school.

Constable Franklin of the Edmonton Police Service will once again be teaching the D.A.R.E. program to our grade 6 students. D.A.R.E. educates children at the crucial grade five/six level, which prepares them for entry into junior high and high school, where they are most likely to encounter pressure to use drugs and make negative choices. The elementary curriculum helps children increase their self-esteem and provides them with the knowledge and skills to help them refuse drugs and resist violence as well as teaching other valuable life skills.

Not to be outdone, Avalon has had many activities and events over the past few months. We held a Wake-A-thon to raise money and awareness for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Over 82% of all money raised goes directly to research for finding a cure for Diabetes and those funds stay right here in Edmonton. Our Avalon students raised a whopping \$5089.55! Great job!

Our Avalon Knights have also been busy in various sports. The Junior Badminton Team has had tremendous success and participated in three events to date. They hosted a Singles exhibition game, and participated in Doubles and Mixed Doubles exhibition events at both Vernon Barford and DS McKenzie. The Senior Badminton team has performed very well again this year, completing another great season of play. Some members even participated in a High School tournament at Concordia College! This season's Indoor Track team consisted of 37 runners, who were chosen from an original 90 students that tried out. After intense practicing the team participated in the quarter finals of the Edmonton Journal Games at the Butterdome, and all four teams came in first or second place in their heats. Both girls' teams and the boys "A" team made it to the finals. The boys' team finished 7th overall, the girls teams placed 3rd and 17th out of 48 teams from all over Northern Alberta. It was a great season, full of excitement and we look forward to next year.

After months of rehearsing their singing, dancing and acting, the cast and crew of this year's drama production "13" The Musical, took to the stage at Harry Ainlay. WOW! Their performance was fantastic! Their dedication and respect throughout the entire process of this production was second to none. 



South Campus Update

Sector 13 Overview

This is the sector south of 60th Avenue. The majority of the land is designated for crop research, but also encompasses the dairy and swine units.

Crops and Land Resource Unit: supports teaching, agronomic and breeding research to improve the sustainable production and quality of forage, cereal, oilseed and horticulture crops.

Dairy Research Technology Centre: a 350-foot long dairy barn including 146 tie stalls and a pipeline milking system housing a herd of about 140 Holstein cows. The unit supports research in production efficiency and sustainability, reproductive efficiency and nutritional quality of milk.

Swine Research and Technology Centre: Including animal facilities, laboratories, a surgery and interpretative centre, the SRTC provides facilities to support research and teaching in nutrition and metabolism, feeds and feedstuff utilization, and reproduction and breeding herd management.

The two-acre, volunteer-run Green and Gold Garden is also in Sector 13. http://www.publichealth.ualberta.ca/collaborators_partners/community_engagement/green_gold_garden

Sector 13 and Dog Walking

Many dog walkers in Ledrum and Malmo take advantage of the farm fields as an area where dogs can be away from traffic. I am guessing that the farm manager has no problem with off-leash dogs over winter months. However, problems exist with dogs damaging research areas between seeding and harvesting. There have been recent reports about a few dog-walkers becoming aggressive with graduate students who have asked them to leash their dogs.

I have written to the University asking if there are particular areas where dog walkers could be encouraged/discouraged. It is very important to try and work with the farm manager as it would be within their rights to lock the 115th Street gate, which would be to the detriment of all.

63 Avenue access

The University expects to begin construction of this access into South Campus in the spring of 2014, with completion targeted for October 2014. Part of the delay is due to "wetland disturbance". There are tentative plans for an Open House on June 12 in Grandview Community Hall concerning the final design of this access. My anticipation is that, once opened, this access will significantly reduce the amount of South Campus traffic going through Lendrum. This is a necessary development.

South Campus Long Range Development Plan Amendments


The University held the last Open House in mid-March to obtain comments on proposed changes to the LRDP. The South Campus Neighbourhood Coalition (Lendrum is one of eight communities that compose this group) noted that the specific amendments to the 2002 LRDP are not explicit. The Coalition would like to see the following concerns adequately addressed before the proposed amendments are approved. We have relayed these concerns to the U of A Board of Governors. We are pleased to continue to work with our local representatives Councillor Don Iveson and MLA Steve Young who have taken interest in this issue and thank them for advancing the community interests.

Update...Continued

Lack of oversight and accountability mechanisms regarding development proposals. **Development principles** need more coherence and more "teeth" to ensure that they are applied. The LRDP talks of guidelines encouraging quality, signature architecture, yet existing developments have occurred in a piecemeal way and lack such signature. A precedent has been set that is inconsistent with the LRDP guidelines.





language in the nine fundamental principles underpinning the 2002 LRDP with their focus on pedestrian friendly, bike compatible development. However, in practice, various developments demand significant onsite parking.

3) Identify "Shared Use" parameters in terms of student and public access to sporting facilities. In the 2002 Plan, Sector 12 is the Academic and Research sector with a recreational land use allotment that broadly covered the current Balmoral Radioisotope Facility, Foote Field, and original Saville Centre. At some point between 2008 and 2010 the "recreational" land use designation was changed to "shared use", this area being expanded and changed with the building of the Go Centre and Balmoral radioisotope facility. The proposed ice arenas, beach volleyball courts, field house and parkade will further expand the ill-defined "shared- use" designation.

People moving into our neighbourhoods over the last decade have been made aware of the development of South Campus, but would not have assumed that this represented such a concentration of sports facilities and the resulting traffic, noise and congestion to the neighbourhoods. We welcome the University's emphasis on community connections, however, we have questions about facilities intended to "support learning, research and campus well-being" are used to heavily promote more general public use without due consideration of impact to our local communities.

The University's position is that their sporting facilities all allow degrees of public use; the University therefore resist guidelines delimiting the extent of use by university students vis à vis the wider public. We recognize that budgetary issues have forced the University towards

greater emphasis on revenue generation; however, we are concerned about the traffic, roadway congestion and noise associated with Shared Use facilities, especially during off-peak times (evenings and weekends). Thus, the degree of public access to South Campus facilities should be defined, and local community concerns should be addressed.

4) A comprehensive **reassessment of traffic impact and parking demand** is essential.
This must take into account the rapidly growing traffic volume with southwest Edmonton, event analysis at shared use facilities, and the impact of South Campus LRT station.

Lendrum **Nature News**

JUNE 2013

There have been lots of things happening in the Natural Area over the last two months. The willow buds have swollen and opened, producing some long, soft, spiky catkins and there are pussy willows on two of the shrubs near the path. The saskatoons are blooming, as are the dandelions, a sure sign of spring. The silver buffaloberry have leafed out and will soon be blooming. High-bush cranberries are growing up nicely from the base after the rabbits feasted on the tops over the winter. If you look very carefully, you will find strawberry flowers in the grass by the south walkway. The prickly roses will be blooming by mid-June as will the dogwood. We have requested a few replacement plants from the city for those that died over the winter and will be planting those at a future workbee.

We are seeing many different butterflies in Lendrum, including the large dark Mourning Cloak with light upper wing edges. The Spring Azure is a smallish bright blue butterfly that you might find feeding on willow, saskatoon and chokecherry.

Many of our migrating birds have returned including: what I call the "school-yard" gulls or ring-billed gulls. You will no doubt have heard the crows, who are now probably sitting on eggs. Robins have been busy building nests, as have house finches. I recently heard chipping sparrows and we hope the savannah sparrow returns and decides to nest in the low shrubs this year.
